Harry, towards the completion of his career with NCR, found himself researching and writing a paper to justify the introduction of pre-retirement courses to NCR UK. What is a Nacarecan?

A Nacarecan is one who was here before Television, the Pill, Penicillin, Polio jabs and Antibiotics.

We were here before Frozen Food, Nylon, Radar, Fluorescent Lights, Credit Cards, Ball Point Pens and NCR (National Cash in our day).

For us Time-Sharing meant togetherness, a Chip was a piece of Wood or Potato, Hardware meant hardware and Software was not even a word.

We were before Tights, Drip dry Clothes, Dishwashers, Tumble Driers, Freezers and Electric Blankets, before men wore long hair and earrings and women wore dinner jackets.

We were before 'Burgers, the 40 hour week and the NHS.

We got married first and lived together afterwards; how quaint can you get?

Girls wore Peter Pan collars and thought that cleavage was something the butcher did.

In our day smcking was fashionable, Grass was for mowing, Coke was something you burnt on the stove and Pot was something you cooked in.

A Gay person was the life and soul of the party and nothing more, while AIDS meant beauty lotion or help for people in trouble.

We are today's Senior Citizens - a hardy bunch when you think how our world has changed and the adjustments we have had to make!

A Link With The Past

In 1939, the 74th Yeomanry Division became dismounted cavalry (emblem a broken spur!) and were then incorporated into the Royal Artillery as 74th Medium Regiment Royal Artillery. In 1940 they moved to East Kent with their HQ located at Dane Court, Tilmanstone, owned at that time by the Earl of Plymouth.

" B Battery" was located at Rookery Nook, 'a pleasing Mansion of Tudor tendencies and a noted rookery' ... in actual fact Brook House, Ash. One of their tasks was to provide guards for the East Kent Light Railway, used at that time for 250 ton railway truck- mounted howitzer guns, along it's route towards Sandwich. With a range of only 12.5 miles the guns were no match to their cousins across the Channel that shelled East Kent almost daily in an arc from Folkestone to Ramsgate

The British guns were intended to add a roaring welcome to any German invader who may dare to

approach the English coast. Because the guns could not traverse the carriages would be moved up and down the railway track to make use of the bends to gain direction. Incidentally, these were heavy naval guns rescued from scrapped ships and totally unsuitable for the purpose.


Only one was fired once, the resulting shock waves breaking every window in the village of Ash. The local doctor remembers an official "from the Ministry" calling to pay his father 2/6d in compensation!

For the rest of the war the guns were trundled out from their underground shelters for practice loading and shooting (still visible and now used as a splendid 'robber's cave' by the local school children along with the shell stores). Winston Churchill graced the battery with a fleeting visit in 1940.

During this time the battery was turned out to investigate parachutists seen coming down nearby. They found two Cemetery, Staffs. The pilot of the plane, a Dornier, survived and appeared very recently on Anglia on a programme concerning the Blitz. He was, at that time the youngest pilot in the Luftwaffe and is now aged 71, a farmer. This was only one of several encounters, albeit at some distance, with the Hun.

Part of the Dornier hung in the Officers Mess whilst a blade from a downed Messerschmitt adorned the Sergeants Mess.

" X" recalls long boring periods of guard duty, only relieved by incidents like those described above and the antics of farm animals in adjoining fields: he has particularly vivid memories of a very randy bull in the field opposite the guard post! Post had to be collected from Eastry post office and these trips were combined with "X's" driving instruction due to the severe shortage of petrol at that time. This also meant that there was no transport for those going on



Who Is "Y"?

At the last organisers meeting you asked us to each provide a picture of ourselves when about 25 years of age, my contribution is attached. It was taken in Hanover in the summer of 1945 shortly after the German surrender. Most of the city of Hanover had been reduced to rubble but fortunately for our regiment a group of luxury flats had escaped the bombing and the photo shows me (on the left) with two chums relaxing at the side of the private swimming pool attached to the flats.

The question is who is it? As a clue, I can state quite categorically that it isn't "X" above. All is revealed on our penultimate page! dead German airman which they placed in a farm cart and wheeled to a barn where the local 'bobby' took over. They were somewhat upset at the time because the airmen were buried in the field next to the church, the vicar saying that "the churchyard was no place for those heathens!" The soldiers felt, with perhaps more christian feelings than the vicar that "they were only ordinary blokes like us".

Later they were re-interred in the graveyard and, even later moved to the Cannock Chase German Military leave: "Shepherdswell was the nearest station and we rose very early to walk there complete with kitbag" (a distance of some five miles). In 1943 "X" moved on to North Africa, but that's another story!

The question is who was "X"? Easily answered by inspecting the photo above, paying particular attention to the smart soldier above and slightly to the left of the officer sitting farthest left. Perhaps our regular contributor, Jim Bell may care to comment?

The Farm Gate

Retirement is about having more time to devote to leisure interests and pursuits, time that was not available when working full-time for the company.

As a member of FED I spent a lot of time as a student on technical courses. Sitting in front of a blackboard or projection screen listening to an instructor was second nature to most of us. Recently, that whole experience was repeated, this time however, the instructors were biologists! Towards the end of March I completed a training course with the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries on Country Wildlife Management.

Why had I chosen to do this? Quite simply, to complement my interest in, and knowledge of the countryside. For a considerable number of years I have devoted time and energy to an estate near Bristol; in return it has provided me with much relaxation and healthy exercise.
